Course Title: CADD 1600 3D DESIGN/ MODELING SOLIDWORKS
Credits: 3 Credits
Class Hours: 3 Class Hour, 1 Lab Hours

Course Description:

A “hands-on” learning experience in the methods and use of 3D design using SolidWorks. The students will learn the methods and practices of designing individual components as well as entire assemblies. Modeling, editing, and presentation practices are integral parts of the learning experience along with real world lessons involving the theory and techniques outlined in this class. **Prerequisite(s):** CADD 1200 or **Prior drawing Experience**

Course Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. Know and understand the difference between a geometry-based CAD program and a parametric-based CAD program.
2. Understand SolidWorks user interface and how to use it.
3. Construct solid models of objects using SolidWorks commands
4. Create Assemblies using SolidWorks part files
5. Do editing and design changes on existing part models.

Course Competencies:

The following are detailed course competencies intended to support the course outcomes:

1. A basic level of computer literacy of the Windows environment is expected. The student should know how to open files, save files and follow a path to a file either on a hard disk or on a removable storage device.

The following are general education competencies intended to support the course outcomes:

2. CAD basics which are covered in CAD 1200, Computer-Aided Drafting I, or a prior understanding of Drafting/Drawing concepts are needed for this course.

Topics to Be Covered:

1. Mastery of Interface and command usage
2. Mastery and practice of SolidWorks Commands
3. Intermediate & Advanced techniques on how to use the commands most effectively
4. Obtain a working knowledge of SolidWorks to the point of being employable

Course Assessments:

The following performance assessments will be used to demonstrate students' understanding, knowledge, and skills:

1. Students will be assessed on their ability to perform "hands on" creation of design exercises evaluated on accuracy, clarity, and techniques learned in this course.
2. Students will be assessed on their retention of learned materials through written or "hands on" designs for testing.

Grading Policy:

If you cannot take a test when scheduled, you must notify the instructor and make arrangements to take the test prior to the scheduled date. Homework not turned in on time is subject to a 25% grade reduction. Homework will not be accepted if more than one week late or after an assignment has been returned to the class, whichever comes sooner. Homework should reflect your understanding of the subject, not that of your classmates. There will be no makeup on missed labs. Make every effort to attend every lab.

Students who fail a course and whose last assignment is submitted after the FA date will earn an F for the course. An FN is assigned to students who do not submit any assignments.
