- Analyze and evaluate written expression by reading critically for elements that reflect an awareness of situation, audience, purpose, and diverse points of view, as well as credible evidence and persuasive strategies.
- Research, organize, and compose papers using correct diction, syntax, usage, grammar, mechanics, and MLA format.
- Incorporate credible evidence and analysis according to MLA standards and demonstrate effective argumentative strategies.

Course Assessments:

The following performance assessments will be used to demonstrate students' understanding, knowledge, and skills:

Documented Essays (5 – including Midterm Essay Exam, Final Essay Exam, and Research Paper) 750 points – 75%

Short Assignments (2 @ 50 points) 100 points – 10%

Discussions (10) 100 points – 10%

Reading Quizzes (5) 50 points – 5%

Total 1000 points – 100%

Grading Policy:

Feedback will be provided on all written work. The expectation is that you will use the feedback to make improvements on the next writing assignment. The rubric used for essays in the course can be found on the "Content" page. Grades will be posted within a week except for unusual circumstances. In any case, grades for one writing assignment will be posted before the next writing assignment is due.

Late Work Policy & Make-up Procedures for Missed Assignments and Work:

Five points are deducted for each day that a written assignment is late. Late work will be accepted for **three days only**, after the due date, except in extenuating circumstances such as hospitalization (documentation required).

An exception to this policy is the Research Paper. Because the schedule allows several weeks for students to work on this large paper, the expectation is for all submissions to come in on or before the due date.

Any Research Paper that is submitted after the posted due date can earn only half credit, for up to three days. To avoid missing this very important date, you will need to **get your topic approved by the date posted on the Weekly Schedule** and give yourself plenty of time on the paper. Students who make high grades on the research paper are typically those who do not delay in getting their topics approved.

No late work is accepted for Discussions or Reading Quizzes.

Attendance Policy

The College is not an attendance taking institution as defined by 34 CFR 668.22(b)(1) in the Code of Federal Regulations; however, students are expected to attend all scheduled classes and laboratories.

- Absences in a course may affect a student's final grade.
- Tardiness may also affect a student's final grade.
- Students are responsible for all work/tests that occur during any missed class session(s).
- Students who are sick or not well enough to attend class must notify the instructor as soon as possible before the scheduled class time, unless incapacitated or unable to do so. In that case, students must contact the instructor as soon as is reasonably possible.
- If students have an unavoidable conflict with a scheduled class session, they must notify the instructor, preferably before the class session, or as soon as possible.

For purposes of financial aid continued attendance is determined via engagement in the course. This can be accomplished in several ways including, but not limited to, continued attendance and/or participation in on-ground class sessions, participating in D2L as prompted (e.g., responding to an instructor's email, posting to a discussion board), and/or completing and submitting assignments.)

To the extent that attendance is kept in this class it is not for the purpose of the College but is instead associated with the instructor's individual grading rubric. **My specific requirements are as follows:**

Although we do not meet in a classroom on campus, you are "attending" when you work on the course. I will "count attendance" after the first week.

All students must e-mail me through the Course Mail with the statement that you have read all the "Getting Started" materials. If you do not check in with me, I will assume you are not "attending," and after the first two weeks, I will report your non-attendance through official channels that may affect your financial aid disbursement. After that, I will "count attendance" when you turn in assignments. **In order to be successful in the class, you should do all the work.**

Requirements for Papers and Other Course Elements - Please read carefully so you will not lose points by failing to submit in a correct manner.

Each required paper will have its own set of instructions that students will be given well in advance of the due date. It is important to pay close attention to specific guidelines. The assignments for essays and other papers can be found under the "Assignments" tool.

You are expected to submit all essays and assignments.

All written work is required to be typed in a Word or Rich Text Format document. I cannot open some programs, and if a student submits in some program other than Word or Rich Text Format, I will have to ask for a new submission, which will cause late points to accrue.

Students who do not have a mastery of standard English usage and grammar will be expected to refer to appropriate sections of *A Writer's Reference* in order to gain skills in the areas of weakness. The Learning Center provides grammar workshops and free tutoring. Tutors do not "fix" substandard papers. If you wish to get help from the tutors, choose two areas of weakness, and those will be the areas of focus when you are working with the tutors.

Students must use correct MLA documentation for all written assignments. **This means every paper is required to have citations and a Works Cited page – all essays and the short assignments, as well.** Please pay close attention to this requirement. Exceptions are not allowed. No excuses are allowed. Failure to use correct MLA documentation will result in the loss of substantial points on written work. The MLA section in *A Writer's Reference* will provide models for you to follow, and I will refer you to those models for citations and Works Cited entries.

- **ESSAYS:** Five documented essays are due during the semester. This includes the Research Paper, Midterm and Final essays. Due dates are listed on the "Weekly Schedule" on the Content page. Requirements for Essays 1, 2, and 4 (Research Paper) can be found in the "Assignment Dropbox" under Evaluation. Essay 3 is the Midterm and Essay 5 is the Final. You will access them under "Quizzes." The essays must conform to the course requirements listed. All sources discussed in each essay must be documented according to MLA format and must be listed on the Works Cited page at the end of the paper. Use *A Writer's Reference*, the most recent edition, as a reference.
- **SHORT ASSIGNMENTS:** Two short assignments are due during the semester. Refer to "Assignments" for specific instructions. These are worth 50 points each. They are much shorter than essays – approximately 500 words. However, the short assignment must be a sharply focused response to the prompt. Use MLA format and respond in meaningful paragraphs, much like an essay. The due

dates are listed on the Weekly Schedule. Include citations and a Works Cited page. Use *A Writer's Reference*, the most recent edition, as a reference.

- **RESEARCH PAPER:** The topic for the argumentative research paper (Essay 4) should relate to one of the broad subjects discussed in "Research Activities" at the end of each chapter we are covering this semester. Refer to the "Assignment Dropbox" for the specific requirements. The due date is listed on the "Weekly Schedule." The paper should be 1200-1500 words in length plus a Works Cited page, and it must conform to the course requirements. The paper must support a clear thesis that sets forth the main idea, and it must present an argument. All sources discussed in the paper must be documented according to MLA format and listed on the Works Cited page at the end of the paper. Refer to *A Writer's Reference*, the most recent edition. **IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT RESEARCH PAPER:** If you submit your research paper after the due date, you can earn only **half credit** for only 3 days. You should plan to be on time with this assignment!
- **DISCUSSIONS:** There are 10 discussion questions in the course. Use the Discussion board as an opportunity to interact with others in the class, simulating a classroom discussion. **Responses are due one minute before noon on Friday. Late responses will not be graded.**
- **READING QUIZZES:** There are 5 quizzes over the reading material in the text. Note on the "Weekly Schedule" the due dates for each quiz. **Submit through "Quizzes" on Sunday night, one minute before midnight.** Quiz 1 is over Chapter 1; Quiz 2 is over Chapter 2; Quiz 3 is over Chapter 3; Quiz 4 is over Chapter 4; Quiz 5 is over Chapter 5.
- **MIDTERM AND FINAL:** Each of these will be a **2-hour writing**. The computer will lock you out after 2 hours. You will find the requirements for each under "Quizzes" and you will go to "Quizzes" to access the tests. For both the midterm and final, you'll have 2 topics from which to choose one, and that one will be your writing assignment. Each of these is shorter than an essay, but they will measure how well you have mastered the skills for academic writing. You will be able to use your e-texts but **you are not allowed to use any other outside sources. The only sources you need are the essays from our book.**

Communication with your instructor is essential! The very best method of communication with me is through Course Mail. Go to "Classlist," find my name, compose a message, and send to me – or reply to a message I have sent you. You will find a new Announcement posted every week on the

Home Page. If you do not have internet access at your house, you need a plan for working on this course several times a week, perhaps at the Library where you have free use of computers. You will be able to use D2L to check grades, communicate with other students in the class and with me, and send assignments through the Assignment Dropbox.

Each week you should do these things:

- Click on the Lesson for that week and work through everything!
- Read assignment selections in the textbook.
- Work on upcoming assignments.
- Check your instructor's comments on previous assignments.
- Check "Weekly Schedule" to stay on target.

Students are a successful in the course have a few traits in common:

- They observe all due dates.
- They contact me through the Course Mail with questions.
- They read everything I provide/assign.
- They make sure they understand MLA documentation.
- They study every returned paper so they won't make the same mistakes again.

I look forward to hearing from you the first week of class, telling me that you have read all the "Getting Started" materials and you understand the requirements of the course.
