Grading Policy:

Group/Student Presentation:

^{*}Reference ANA Standards of Professional Nursing Practice

- 1. Each student will be assigned to one of 8 groups for presentation purposes.
- 2. Each group will be randomly assigned to a presentation topic related to professional nursing issues.
- 3. Each presentation will be **40 minutes in length**. **Attire is to be professional** as if you are presenting at a national conference. Orations will be presented during the second hour of class.
- 4. Each student is required to actively participate in the topic's research and verbal presentation.
- 5. The presentation group will prepare a written paper of their seminar topic to be submitted electronically to their instructor through D2L drop box assignment **one week prior to the presentation**. The written paper will use APA format and *will not exceed 8 pages*. Power Points, Study Guide and NCLEX-type questions will also be submitted electronically through D2L drop box to the instructor **one week prior to presentation**. Study guides may be sent to classmates through D2L.
- 6. Each member of the assigned group will receive the same grade for the submitted paper; individualized grades will be given for the presentation portion. These two grades will be totaled for a final grade for the presentation. You will be expected to upload to the D2L dropbox a blank rubric with your name typed at the top of the form for grading purposes.
- 7. Student Presentation rubric is included in this syllabus (page 13).
- 8. The group presentation will account for 10% of the course grade.

Resume and Cover Letter:

- 1. So that you will be prepared to apply for internships, externships or residencies at local hospitals, you will draft a resume and cover letter in class. We will review resume drafts during the first class in addition to welcoming our Director of Career Services to speak.
- 2. Each student will complete a professional resume and cover letter to be submitted to the course instructor via D2L dropbox by the date noted on the syllabus. The art of resume writing will be covered in class. However, it will be the student's responsibility to draft and finalize a resume and cover letter, and to submit via D2L dropbox to the instructor by said date and time.

Exams

- 1. There will be two tests administered throughout this class. Test will be taken through the D2L system.
- 2. The dates for these tests are provided on the course schedule posted within this syllabus.
- 3. Each test will account for 15% of the overall course grade for a total of 30%.
- 4. All tests in this course count toward the final grade and none will be dropped.
- 5. Test scores will be available on D2L. Test scores will be available within one week of your examination or quiz. If you suspect an error in your posted score, please notify your nursing instructor in writing. After one week, all grades are final.
- 6. By taking tests through D2L, you have agreed to the following: I will not use a smartwatch, auto-summarizing tools, cheating sheets, cellphone, cameras, headphones, screen shots or any other mechanism capable of reproducing this test. I understand that cheating directly impacts the academic integrity of this test.
- 7. On exams administered through D2L, the final D2L submission is the official answer sheet. All answers for the test will only be taken from the D2L submission.
- 8. Per the Nursing Handbook:

"Scheduled tests and/or quizzes should be taken at the scheduled time. If a student is absent on the day of an exam, the department/division secretary must be notified prior to testing. The student is also responsible for contacting the instructor of record for the course.

Absence from an exam for whatever reason will result in a 5-percentage point deduction from the exam grade. It is the student's responsibility to take the makeup exam/quiz at a time designated by the course coordinator; preferably within one week and/or before the next scheduled didactic class. The format for the makeup exams/quizzes is at the discretion of the course coordinator and may not be identical to the originally scheduled exam/quiz."

Kaplan Exams

- 1. During the course, one standardized achievement exam will be administered to evaluate mastery of the content and prepare students for the NCLEX-RN exam. This integrated test is mandatory and will be worth 5% of the overall grade for the course. You must achieve a passing grade set forth by Kaplan in order to receive the 5% toward your final grade. Students who do not receive a passing grade as set by Kaplan will receive 0 towards final grade, and students who pass according to Kaplan will receive a 100. It is highly recommended that you practice for this exam by taking Management/ Professional Issues Focused Review tests. Kaplan requires the use of its own Lockdown Browser.
- **2.* Predictor Test**: This 150-question test will be offered at the conclusion of the fourth semester and after the students have completed their final exams. This test predicts the probability of passing the NCLEX-RN exam. This test will serve as the nursing comprehensive exit exam at NSCC. The minimal passing standard on the Kaplan Predictive Test required for graduation from the nursing program at NSCC will be 60. A score of 60 represents a 95% likelihood that a nursing graduate will pass the NCLEX-RN. The passing score of 60 will be reflected in the course grade for NURS 2240 which is taken in the last semester and will be required for course completion of NURS 2240. If the student does not achieve a 60 on the Kaplan Predictor Test, a zero will be assigned for the exam. 50% of final course grade is based on the student's performance on the Kaplan Predictor Test. Students must achieve a passing score of 60 to receive the 50%. (The Department of Nursing reserves the right to change the percentage required based on recommendations or requirements from the national exam scoring center).

To pass NURS 2240 and sit for the NCLEX-RN, the student must achieve the minimum passing standard on the Kaplan Predictor Test. Failure to achieve a passing score of 60 will result in a failure (F) being given for NURS 2240. The student will not be allowed to sit for the NCLEX-RN. Please refer to the NSCC Nursing Handbook.

Final Examination

- 1. The final examination in this class will be comprehensive.
- 2. This examination will be worth 15% of the overall grade for this course.
- 3. The date for the final examination will be provided once final exams are scheduled.
- 4. By taking quizzes through D2L, you have agreed to the following: I will not use a smartwatch, auto-summarizing tools, cheating sheets, cellphone, cameras, headphones, screen shots or **any other mechanism capable of reproducing this test.** I understand that cheating directly impacts the academic integrity of this test.

FA
