Grading Policy:

Grader Projects

Grader projects will be assigned for each chapter through MyLabIT. Students will read the assigned chapter, complete the projects, submit the files for each chapter, and receive automatic feedback from MyLabIT. Grades are recorded immediately upon submission of the projects. The **four lowest grader projects** will be dropped at the end of the term.

Quizzes

Quizzes will be given covering material in each chapter and will be completed in NS Online. Quizzes will be scored after they are submitted, and grades should be posted immediately. The **lowest quiz grade** will be dropped at the end of the term.

Discussions

Your instructor will post **assigned discussion questions** on the discussion board. Participation in these discussions is required and will be counted as part of the final grade. A discussion grading rubric will be used to evaluate discussions. Discussion grades will be posted within one week.

Database Project

Students will complete a database project toward the end of the term. Specific directions for the project are provided in an instructional handout in the Content area of the course. The project evaluation rubric will be used to assess the database project. Project grades will be posted within one week.

Exams

Two exams will be given: a **midterm exam** and **final exam**. Each exam is worth 15 percent of the final grade. Exams must be completed by the DUE date. Exam grades will be posted within one week.

Late Work Policy & Make-up Procedures for Missed Assignments and Work:

Grader projects, quizzes, and discussions have **due dates** and **cutoff dates**. In order to allow a grace period for late submissions, the **cutoff date** for assignments will be **two days after the due date**. Grader projects, quizzes, discussions, and the database project will NOT be accepted after the cutoff date.

The midterm exam and final exam must be completed by the **DUE dates**.
