- Explain the fundamental properties of ASP, C#, HTML5, CSS, and Bootstrap.
- Construct a readable, well documented, and syntactically correct ASP web forms application.
- Predict the state changes of a program in execution and trace its execution.

- Use critical thinking skills.

Topics to Be Covered:

- · Basic parts of an ASP web project including the page life cycle
- · Which control caused postback
- · Basic ways to connect to a database
- Introduction to Bootstrap and CSS
- Bootstrap Modal forms
- · Data manipulation
- · Uploading files to the web sever
- · ASP master page, session state and nav bars

Course Assessments:

The following performance assessments will be used to demonstrate students' understanding, knowledge, and skills:

- Bootstrap Training 10% of the final grade.
- Labs 10% of the final grade. There will be (7) hands on lab assessments.
- Projects 30% of the final grade. There will be (3) hands on project assessments.
- Final Exam 50% of the final grade.

- Be correct and meet the required specifications when turned in for credit.
