Course Assessments: We will use the following assessments to demonstrate your understanding, knowledge, and skills:

- 1. **Fieldwork:** complete observations of infants, toddlers, preschoolers, and school-age children and additional application activities.
- 2. Class Discussion: participate in online discussions with classmates on course content.
- 3. **Child Observations:** complete ongoing observations of several children using a variety of tools and write a reflective report. Detailed instructions are in the Assignments area.
- 4. **Book Reflection:** read an assigned novel or biography and write a reflection related to child resilience. Detailed instructions and grading rubrics are provided in the Assignments area.
- 5. **Exams**: complete quizzes and periodic exams. There are three exams to be taken online and are timed. Only one attempt is allowed on the exam. Exams cannot be taken late.

Grading Policy:

Both Reflection assignments <u>are required</u>: Book Reflection and Observation Reflection Report. You are required to submit both to receive a passing grade in this course. If you fail to turn in either one of these, you will receive an F for the course. These are major assessments in the course that demonstrate your knowledge and skill related to the course outcomes and NAEYC Standards. Completion of both is mandatory for passing the course.

Assignments, Instructions, and Grading Rubrics

Detailed instructions and grading criteria (grading rubrics) will be provided for each assignment. The grading rubrics will be used to award points earned for student work. It is expected that students follow instructions carefully, study the grading criteria, and ask questions if they do not understand an assignment. For some assignments, you will be required to complete the grading rubric as a self-grading component of the assignment. The purpose of this self-grading is to focus your attention on the expectations for the assignment and enhance your own self-evaluation and critical thinking skills. Even though you may submit a self-scored rubric, the instructor will make the final determination on all grades and scores.

The easiest way to make sure you have completed all required activities is to follow each link in the Content area and submit assignments, discussions, tests, and projects by the due dates. Refer to the syllabus for specifics on grading criteria and points for assignments, projects, and exams. **Note: You**

must view all the module content before completing your fieldwork activity for each module. You will use the information from the chapter reading and module content to complete your fieldwork. If module content has not been viewed, the fieldwork will not be graded. The instructor reserves the right to assign a 0 for the fieldwork.

Assignment Format

Students must submit assignments in Microsoft Word format or Rich Text Format (RTF) format using 10 or 12-point font. Spelling, punctuation, grammar, and sentence structure will be taken into consideration in grading all assignments. Assignments should reflect college-level work. Points will be deducted for numerous errors. Assignments are submitted through the Assignment Dropbox tool in this course or on the Discussion Board. Any late assignment also must be submitted in the Assignment Box. Assignments are not accepted through email.

Fieldwork with Children

Some of the fieldwork assignments and observations require you to engage in activities with young children. (See specific instructions on assignments.) You must have access to young children (several children within the age range of birth to eight) in order to complete fieldwork assignments. This can be in informal settings such as family or relative's homes, but it is preferable, if possible, to do these experiences in an early childhood program such as a child care center or family child care home. These experiences require the student to be in the "teacher" role; thus, it is not acceptable to do these with your own children. Let the instructor know if you need help or clarification.

Photographs for Assignments

Some assignments may require you to take photographs of your work or project as part of the assignment instructions. You will need access to a camera of some type in order to meet this expectation. Even though you are asked to document your work through photos, you are NOT required to take photos of children themselves. Many families do not wish their children to be photographed. You must have written permission from families to photograph children

Late Work Policy & Make-up Procedures for Missed Assignments and Work:

See the Course Calendar and Class Schedule for specific due dates for each Module assignment and exams. You should make every effort to submit assignments on time. If you miss a deadline, you can submit an assignment late up to one week beyond the due date, and no later. Late assignments will have 10% points deducted. No assignments will be accepted beyond ONE (1) week late. You should deliver assignments in Central Standard Time or Central Daylight Savings time (whichever is applicable). Assignments are due on Mondays, 12:00 p.m. LATE assignments are not accepted through email; they must be uploaded to the Assignment Dropbox. (NOTE: You must participate in Discussion topics by due date; each topic closes on the Module due date.)

Here is an example of late points deduction on your grade:

EXAMPLE: An assignment worth 100 points is due Feb. 10th. The next class meeting is Feb. 17th, a week later. If not turned in on Feb. 10th, then it is considered late and will have 10% (10 points) deducted from total score. You have up until Feb. 17th to turn in the assignment, but no later. As for grading, if you turned in late and earned 90, 10 points will be deducted, and your final score will be 80.

Grading Turn-around

In general, assignments submitted on time will be graded within 7-10 days of submission due dates. You will be notified if there is a need to vary this schedule. Assignments submitted late, will be graded by the end of the course.

Questions about Graded Assignments and Appointments for Assistance

Any student who is checking into the course at least 3 times each week, reading all assignments and instructions but still not performing well on exams, projects, or assignments should contact the instructor to set up an appointment for assistance. In an online class, students sometimes have more difficulty understanding assignment expectations and instructions, especially on large end of the semester projects. You can request a face-to-face conference for support and assistance on any assignment. Phone calls and emails can also assist in clarification.
