- Analyze significant primary texts as forms of cultural and creative expression.
- Recognize ways in which history has influenced writers from the Age of Enlightenment to the present.
- Develop an interpretation of a literary text, collect research from appropriate sources, support the interpretation with evidence, and cite the source material.
- Identify themes and important authors.

Grading Policy

Essays will be graded with the rubric used by all NSCC English instructors and feedback will be provided on all written work. The expectation is that you will use the feedback to make improvements on the next writing assignment. The rubric used for essays in the course can be found on the "Content" page. All work will be graded as promptly as possible before the next written assignment is due. Questions about grades are always encouraged.

Remember, writing is a process. Please do not be discouraged by one low grade on an essay or another assignment. As you progress in the course, be sure to take feedback and grading rubric breakdowns as opportunities to improve. Discuss your work with the writing tutors and your professor. The goal is to grow as a writer. Writing is not something that we either "have or do not." Writing is a process of reflection and growth. For example, a grammar mistake is an error, but it can be corrected for the next draft or assignment. This is not a reflection on your progress as a writer.

Late Work Policy & Make-up Procedures for Missed Assignments and Work:

- For the three **short reflective writing assignments**, you may submit those up to three days late, but you will lose a letter grade for each day. Because all of these must be submitted to their respective dropboxes on NS Online, you are able to submit your work should the deadline fall on a date you are absent.
- Because the final **research paper** is due on the last Friday of the semester, and because you will have several weeks to work on it, you are expected to turn it in on time. Late papers will only be accepted with a documented excuse.
- Quiz deadlines may be extended with an acceptable excuse on a case-by-case basis.
- **Discussions**: Because these require interaction with your classmates, they cannot be made up. I do, however, award extra points for participation in the weekly discussion threads that go above and beyond the minimum requirements.

In addition, your instructors will clarify what Academic Misconduct looks like and the consequences for violations in each course that you take. The instructor has the authority to assign an "F" or a "zero" for such violations or for the semester grade.

Because you have passed Composition I and it is assumed you know both what plagiarism is and how to avoid it, and because you will have ample time to develop and refine your writing assignments, any reflective writing assignment or essay which contains intentional plagiarism will earn a **zero**. Examples of intentional plagiarism include, but are **not** limited to, the following examples:

- Submitting a paper you wrote for a different class without prior approval from both me and that other instructor, *and* with significant revisions and/or expansions to the original paper, which you will be required to submit along with the revised and/or expanded essay;
- copying-and-pasting whole passages directly from online sources;
- copying-and-pasting passages from multiple sources, mixing them together and presenting them as your own work without the proper formatting and documentation of those sources;
- buying an essay bought from a paper mill;
- using an A.I. service to generate text that you present as your own writing;
- submitting an essay written by a student in another class who had turned in her, his, or their work prior to yours.

If you commit any of the examples* listed above, you may be given a chance to write and submit a new paper, but that is at my discretion, and the new paper will only be capable of earning a "C."

*Once again, the previous list is not exhaustive, so there may be other examples of intentional plagiarism that could result in the preceding penalties.

Any student who plagiarizes more than one assignment risks failing the entire course. Last, *all* instances of plagiarism must be reported to the Vice President of Academic Affairs, who will keep the report on file.

Course Content

Course materials—including literature, supplementary materials, Internet content, and class discussions—may contain graphic content, mature content, and content that some might find difficult or offensive. The course content may be challenging and difficult, but advanced study requires grappling with these topics. No material will be changed or any

substitution allowed. By choosing to remain in this course, you have chosen to accept its requirements. Hearing the voices of writers and of fellow students is an important part of this process, so all of us must work to create an environment that is both respectful and academically rigorous.

Academic Early Alert System

If you are not doing well in your course, your instructor may send you an Early Alert through your @my.nscc.edu email. Testing Procedures

All quizzes, assignments, and tests will be available through the D2L interface. No proctors are needed for the quizzes or tests.

The quizzes should be taken during the week that they are assigned. They are made available to you early in the course and should be completed by the specific deadline dates (see the Calendar for specific due dates). Note: you will only be able to submit answers to the quizzes once.

The tests have limited access. They have a time limit and a limited availability window. Students will be on their honor to complete the test without the use of notes, texts, and/or internet sites. Once the student begins the test, a maximum of two hours will be available to complete it. There will be at least a 48-hour window in which each test will be available. These windows will be clearly posted in the Calendar section of the course.

Make sure that you will have stable internet access on a computer before you begin taking any quizzes or tests.

NOTE: your answers on these quizzes and tests should be your own; if you are found plagiarizing your answers, even from the textbook or the e-lectures, you will lose points for that question and may fail the test in its entirety (see below for a definition of plagiarism).

Grading Procedure

All graded coursework will be returned within two weeks of the due date. The grade for this course will be based on several types of assessment tools.

- The student will participate in a discussion forum to share perspectives with classmates. Discussion questions will be provided as a starting point, but any element of the week's reading material is also acceptable discussion material. The student is expected to participate in ALL 15 discussions. The student's participation will be graded on BOTH frequency of participation and quality of input. The response to the discussion prompt and responses to other students may receive up to 10 points for each topic, for a total of 150 points possible for the whole semester.
- Frequent reading quizzes will be used to ensure the student understands the material presented in the text and online materials. These quizzes will include objective questions (matching, multiple choice) and short answer response questions.
- Periodic reflection assignments will allow the student to explore the significance of the various elements of fiction as they apply to various works read in the course. Each assignment has a specific grading rubric included.
- One fully developed research paper will explore the student's experience of the ideas in the works read in class and place them in context in the student's realworld environment. It will be graded using this rubric. Specific requirements will be discussed in the individual assignments.

• NOTE: Plagiarism, which involves using someone else's words, ideas, or opinions without giving proper credit or documentation, or in "recycling" a paper you wrote for a previous course will result in receiving a grade of zero for the assignment. Intentional attempts to "pass off" someone else's work (even a paper purchased from someone else) will result in failing the course. *Turnitin.com* will be used to check for plagiarism on all papers and assignments.

Class Participation

Your participation in this course is a vital part of the learning environment. Participation includes more than just reading the assignments and completing the quizzes, papers, and tests. You need to use all of the resources available to you. The discussion board is available to you to engage in class-wide explorations of your responses to the readings and the stories. If you do not understand something, post a question to the main discussion board. In all likelihood, someone else in the course will be able to help you understand what you may not be able to figure out on your own.

The weekly discussion questions are NOT optional. You should respond to the prompt in the assignment and read other students' responses as well. I also encourage you to reply to each other's postings. A large part of learning is sharing ideas. I will monitor and provide feedback to postings as well as add probing questions that are suggested by your own responses.

In addition, the email system is available to communicate with the instructor. The instructor is a resource for you to use, too. The main discussion board will also be used to post general information applicable to the class as a whole, so you should check it frequently.

Punctuality

Each week of the course has specific elements that need to be accomplished in that week. Each week's assignment builds on the material in previous weeks. Therefore, you should work on the material in the order given in the schedule of assignments. With the exception of the tests and papers, as long as you complete the material for each module in the week it is due, there are no specific days or times that you need to participate. You can work on this course at a time of day best suited to your needs.

The detailed due dates for the quizzes, tests, and writing assignments are listed in the calendar and should be met. Assignments may be turned in early, but late work (completed after the due date noted in the calendar) will not be accepted, neither will late papers or tests.

Course Ground Rules

A list of basic assumptions and ground rules are noted below:

- Complete assignments in the order and week assigned.
- Participate in weekly discussions in addition to completing the reading, quizzes, assignments, and papers.
- Actively communicate with other students.
- Learn how to navigate in D2L.
- Keep abreast of course announcements that will be posted on the main discussion board.
- Communicate within the course as opposed to using a personal e-mail address.
- Address technical problems immediately.
- Observe course netiquette at all times.

Guidelines for Communication

Email

- Always include a subject line.
- Remember, without facial expressions some comments may be taken the wrong way. Be careful in wording your emails.
- Use standard fonts.
- Do not send large attachments without permission.
- Respect the privacy of other class members.

Discussions

- Review the discussion threads thoroughly before entering the discussion.
- Try to maintain threads by using the "Reply" button rather starting a new topic.
- Do not make insulting or inflammatory statements to other members of the discussion group. Be respectful of other's ideas.
- Be patient and read the comments of other group members thoroughly before entering your remarks.
- Respond in a thoughtful and timely manner.
