Please read the assigned chapters or documents before completing the discussions, quizzes, reports, or essays. You will need to know the definitions of terms and examples in the readings.


Course Outcomes

Course Assessments

My goals for helping you to develop a sociological eye and various critical thinking skills cannot be achieved through multiple-choice testing alone. Therefore, I have designed the course with a variety of course assessments.

- The online discussions are worth fewer points and are designed to give you practice at thinking and writing so that you can succeed at the quizzes, reports, and essays.
- Links to all assessments are in the Content Modules at the course webpage. The Course Schedule tells you which module they are in and when they are due.
- It is each student's responsibility to complete the assessments by the dates that are listed in the course schedule and online calendar.
- If I believe that changes to due dates are necessary, I will announce them in a News item at the course website (NS Online/D2L).

The following performance assessments will give you opportunities to demonstrate your understanding, knowledge, and skills:

Online Discussions = 150 points (15% of course grade)

- online discussions are required each week for attendance
- most weeks, the discussion is worth 10 participation points
- check instructor feedback. It is designed to guide your thinking and improve your writing skills to succeed at the reports and essays.

Written Reports and Essays = 400 points (40% of course grade)

- See instructions for these in the Content Modules and Assignment Dropboxes online.
- Submit them in the dropboxes online.

Multiple-Choice Quizzes = 350 points (35% of course grade)

- All quizzes are online.
- You have 2 attempts at the reading guizzes.
 - Complete them from home using the textbook and other documents in Content.
 - The highest score of these 2 attempts will be recorded in your grade list.
 - Find correct answers to the questions that you answered incorrectly in your quiz submission 1 so that you can improve your score on attempt 2.

Final Exam = 100 points (10% of course grade)

- It includes a combination of multiple choice and short answer questions which ask about information you learned throughout the semester.
- You may complete it online from home or in a computer lab.
- You may NOT use a textbook or search for answers online.

Grading Policy

You may earn a total of 1000 points by the end of the semester. I will determine your final grade by adding the points you earn on all the assignments. See the FA = F for Attendance

Any student who receives a grade of D or lower on the first written essay, report or quiz is required to attend a conference with the instructor to discuss how to improve his or her performance on these assignments. If I consider it appropriate, I will allow students to revise one written report or essay for a higher score.

Honors Option

If you wish to take this course for honors credit, you must be enrolled in the Honors College and complete an Honors Contract. It is your responsibility to inform your instructor within the first four weeks of the semester that you want to complete an Honors Contract for this course.

Late Work Policy & Make-up Procedures for Missed Assignments and Work

I will not accept Online Discussions that are submitted after the date and time listed in the schedule.

I will accept any report or essay within one week after the assignment was due. Every late assignment will receive an automatic reduction of 25% of the points for that assignment.

To submit a late assignment, you must attach it to the correct Assignment Dropbox online. Then email the instructor at the course webpage with your full name, the name of the assignment and explain the reason it is late.

After the half-way point in the semester, you will receive an email message giving you a Quiz Redo Coupon. You will respond to the message with your request to make up a quiz that you missed or to make another attempt at a quiz that you would like to improve.
