Course Goals:

The lectures, class discussions, and readings will expose you to the terms and ideas that represent sociological principles, concepts, and perspectives. It is expected that you will learn the meaning of these

terms and ideas as well as how they apply to "real life." I will devote class time, as well as "office time," to explaining the material thoroughly. You will be required to demonstrate your understanding of these terms and ideas on the quizzes and in papers.

My responses to and feedback for students:

I will respond to your emails within a 24 hour period during the week and I will check email periodically over the weekends and school breaks. The quizzes and assignments will be grade within a week of when they are due.

Please READ all the comments I make on quizzes and assignments, this will aid in your understanding of what aspects you need to improve upon. Feedback on the quizzes are found on the quizzes under each question. I will provide written feedback on each assignment.

Readings:

The assigned readings are indicated in the course schedule. The readings are important to develop an understanding of the terms and ideas that you are expected to learn. The lectures and discussion questions will benefit you more if you have the chapters read before you look at those and certainly before you take the quiz.

NS ONLINE use:

Since this is an online course- everything you need is contained within. Lectures are posted on NS ONLINE for Chapters 1-14 under the CONTENT section. These lectures are created in PowerPoint and you will need a PowerPoint reader to view these. <u>PowerPoint Viewer</u> Once you are on the site you will have to use your a-number and password to access. You may download and print the lectures by using the pure black and white handouts option when printing to help you prepare for answering the discussion questions and for the quizzes. It is the student's responsibility to check D2L (NS Online) and MyNSCC email on a regular basis. These are the official communication channels between the college and students. Students are responsible for the information communicated through those channels. D2L (NS Online) contains specific course information and MyNSCC contains information important for other purposes.

Course Assessments:

The following performance assessments will be used to demonstrate students' understanding, knowledge, and skills:

- 2 General education assessments
- 10 chapter quizzes with 14 practice quizzes
- 11 class participation assignments (discussion questions)
- 3 written assignments

Quizzes:

There is one procedural quiz that ensures the student has read and understands the syllabus. Students will earn 10 points of extra credit if they get 100% on this quiz. Students have an unlimited amounts of attempts.

There are 2 General Education assessments. These are all multiple choice questions and will be given at the beginning of the course and then the second at the end. There are 14 practice quizzes that are worth 5 points per chapter for completion. These quizzes are meant as study tools and will allow students a chance to test themselves.

There are 10 quizzes that are comprised of multiple choice, matching and short answer questions. There is 2 hour limit for each quiz- Do not open the quiz until you are ready to take it and once you begin the quiz you must complete it.

Discussion Questions (DQs)- Participation Activity

All students enrolled in this class are required to check in with me at least once per WEEK via completing a discussion question (s) or by sending me an email (Please note: there are 14 chapters and 11 discussion questions in a 1 week semester). Failure to answer a discussion question or send me an email once a week will result in a FA or F grade. To check in, you will make a list of concepts and their definitions and then write a brief answer to *each* of the chapters' questions listed in the Discussion section of NS ONLINE. These postings are used to count for attendance and are worth up to 15 points each.

Chapters are associated with discussion questions. Make a list of the concepts that are in the textbook with the definitions. The concepts are bold within the text and listed at the end of each chapter. This is worth up to 5 points. Then use the concepts and theoretical frames that are you reading about in each chapter to answer the questions. As you respond, you need to **bold** the concepts/ theoretical frames, using them to answer the questions. Use as many concepts (key terms) as you can to create a solid, in-depth answer. This part is worth up to 10 points.

The answers should be in paragraph form ranging from **300 to 500 words.** After you read the assigned chapters and reviewed the corresponding PowerPoint lecture, answer the question using as many concepts (key terms) as you can. After you post make sure you are responding to at least ONE of your fellow students' posts. Be constructive and professional in the **150 to 350** word response. Indicate what you agree or disagree with and really explain why in detail.

Tips for writing quality discussion question answers:

In academia you need to address each part of a question specifically and explicitly. If there are 5 parts to this particular question, you should have at least 1 solid paragraph (5 to 7 sentences) for each part to really convey what you are trying to say- that is explain what you are thinking and why you think that way). Be explicit and detailed in your answers. Do not be afraid to write.

Please remember that this course is centered on critical thought and is designed to enhance your abilities to analysis, evaluate, and to reason (both to infer and to deduce). To accomplish this, use as many concepts from the chapter as you can to formulate your answer. *Grading rubric for DQ posts is in the Discussion section*

Homework assignments:

There will be 3 homework assignments. Homework assignments will entail work outside the classroom.

READ ALL DIRECTIONS in each of the Assignment drop boxes. ASK QUESTIONS via the discussion board if you do not understand the requirements.

Assignment One: TV Families and Myths about families (Chapter 1 Objective and Critical thinking- Please see Course and Chapter Objectives under content in NS Online for details). (70 total points).

Purpose: To do an analysis of a TV show that you watched as a child. This assignment fulfills Chapter 1 Objective and the General education outcome of critical thinking, and writing clear, well-organized documents..

Skills: You will use your analytical and writing skills to complete this assignment

Knowledge: Develop the critical thinking skill of analysis and to see how social and cultural ideas (i.e. myths) are perpetuated and how they influence perception.

Tasks:To write a college level essay answering the following questions. Parts 2 through 5 should have a 5 to 7 sentence paragraph for each question. Upload completed file into the Assignment Dropbox.

I highly recommend that you label each part of the assignment and you MUST **BOLD the concepts (the bold words in the directions) and make sure you address each concept separately. Make sure you have at least five to seven sentences for each (paragraph) part of this assignment- be explicit and very detailed in your answers.

<u>Assignment 2 "Big Fat Greek Wedding"</u> (Chapter 8 Objective. Please see Course and Chapter Objectives under content in NS Online for details)

Purpose: To use a set of concepts to do an analysis of the courtship of Toula and Ian in the movie "My Big Fat Greek Wedding." This assignment fulfills Chapter 8 Objective as well as the General education outcome of critical thinking and writing clear, well-organized documents.

Skills: You will use your analytical and writing skills to complete this assignment using concepts to explain how the couple was either pushed

together or could have been pulled apart by their families' interactions/reactions to the couple and to each other.

Knowledge: Develop the ability to use (apply) concepts to explain a social phenomenon (i.e. courtship) as well as enhancement of the skill of analysis and writing.

Tasks:To write a college level essay addressing each of the concepts (factors) presented. Each concept should have a 5 to 7 sentence paragraph to fully explain how each influenced the couple. Please visit the Assignment Dropbox to submit the assignment

All concepts (specific micro and macro factors) must be **bold** and used in explaining the development and the continuation of the relationship. Do not describe the movie- this is an analysis- so you are to use the concepts to explain. Again I strongly suggest that you label each part of the assignment and each concept has it's own 5-7 sentence paragraphbe explicit and very detailed in your answers.

******************* I have placed a copy of the movie in the library of the main campus. If you cannot view in the library, you will have to rent it or check with your local public libraries.

Assignment 3: Check your facts on family issues: (General Ed Objective: Critical thinking. Please see Course and Chapter Objectives under content in NS Online for details).

Purpose: To evaluate the validity and legitimacy of 4 different types of sources and to think about why "facts" are presented the ways they are in each type of source. It's important to develop the critical thinking skill of evaluation so we can differentiate between credible and non-credible sources of information. This assignment also covers the General Ed Objective of: critical thinking, knowing how to locate, evaluate, and use information sources and to write clear, well-organized documents. **Skills:** You will use your evaluative, writing, and research skills to complete this assignment. REALLY THINK ABOUT THE

WORDS/images each source is using and WHY they are using them. **Knowledge:** Develop the ability to examine sources and to evaluate the legitimacy, accuracy and validity of different types of information, as well as enhancement of academic writing skills. **Task:** Complete the attached worksheet. Please go to the Assignment dropbox and then to Assignment 3 for a blank worksheet. Complete and then upload completed file. The following site may be helpful in writing this paper:

You may email or post the question on the

discussion board. Feedback on discussion questions can be found in the grade section. Feedback on the quizzes is found on the quizzes at the top of each quiz. I will provide feedback within each assignment and upload the document in the assignment section, so that you can download to see my comments or I will provide feedback in the grade section of the assignment dropbox. This feedback will aid in your understanding of what aspects you need to improve upon.

• Be responsible for all that is mentioned in class or in the required readings. This means READ EVERYTHING that is posted and all feedback on your individual assignments. Since this is a 3 credit course, it is expected that students put in 2 to 3 hours for every credit hour (9 hours per week, since there is no "classroom" it may take more than 12 hours).
