Course Description:

Surgical Technology and Patient Care II is a continuation of SURG 1410. Students continue the study of surgical team practice, patient-care concepts and practices. Students will continue studies in surgical procedures, incisions, wound healing, operating, pathology and common applications. A grade of "C" or above in all Surgical Technology courses must be earned prior to graduation

PREREQUISITES: Acceptance into the Surgical Technology Program.

COREQUISITES: SURG 1102, SURG 1304, SURG 1305, SURG 2310, SURG 1410, and BIOL 1000.

Course Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will demonstrate knowledge of

1. Proper preparation and disinfection of the operating suite
2. Proper use of supplies, furniture, equipment and instrumentation
3. Asepsis and sterile technique
4. Hand hygiene and the surgical hand scrub
5. Gowning and gloving oneself and others
6. Surgical counts
7. Skin preparation and application of sterile drapes
8. Perioperative case management in the scrub and assistant circulator roles
9. Abdominal incisions, hemostasis and exposure
10. Wound closure, surgical dressings, and wound healing
11. Tissues replacement materials
12. Emergency patient situations

Academic Dishonesty:

Any form of academic dishonesty, cheating, plagiarizing, or other academic misconduct is prohibited. "Plagiarism may result from: (1) failing to cite quotations and borrowed ideas, (2) failing to enclose borrowed language in quotation marks, and (3) failing to put summaries and paraphrases in your works" (A Writer's Reference, 331). Academic dishonesty may be defined as, but is not limited to, intentionally trying to deceive by

claiming credit for the work of another person, using information from a web page or source without citing the reference, fraudulently using someone else's work on an exam, paper, or assignment, recycling your own work from another course, purchasing papers or materials from another source and presenting them as your own, attempting to obtain exams/materials/assignments in advance of the date of administration by the instructor, impersonating someone else in a testing situation, providing confidential test information to someone else, submitting the same assignment in two different classes without requesting both instructors' permission, allowing someone else to copy or use your work, using someone else's work to complete your own, altering documents, transcripts or grades, and forging a faculty/staff member's signature.

In addition to other possible disciplinary sanctions that may be imposed through regular college procedures as a result of academic dishonesty, the instructor has the authority to assign an "F" or a "Zero" for the exercise, paper or examination, or to assign an "F" for the course.

If a student believes that he/she has been erroneously accused of academic dishonesty and if his/her final grade has been lowered as a result, the student may appeal the case through the appropriate college grade appeal procedures.
