Gen Z: Educating the Emerging Generation

"We know that our students are changing and that these changes impact our influence, engagement, and effectiveness in the classroom. In my portion of the presentation, I intend to unpack what I consider to be the significant psychosocial and cultural realities that our students are facing. These significant issues are the timing and duration of adolescence, multiple-selves, and objectification. An awareness of these important markers will enable us to more effectively negotiate the challenges we encounter." - Dr. Steven Bonner

"I have taught at Lipscomb University since 1991. While every generation of learners presents certain challenges, Generation Z have proven to be the most distinctive in terms of learning styles and their unique backstory. We who have taught for years, can no longer teach in the same manner and expect our students to gain the competencies needed. I will present the specific challenges of the 5 generations we currently teach (sometimes in the same classroom!) with an emphasis on the particular challenges of Generation Z. Believe it or not, there is good news! They are teachable, but we have to start from where they are." - Dr. Earl Lavender

Steven Bonner serves as Assistant Dean in the College of Bible and Ministry and Chair of Undergraduate Bible. He received his D.Min. in Youth, Family, & Culture from Fuller Theological Seminary. His research focuses on adolescent psychosocial & systemic development, the commodification of adolescence in youth sports, and the extension of adolescence, and adolescent moral reasoning; this research has been presented internationally. Steven has published Understanding the Changing Adolescent in "Adoptive Youth Ministry" and Understanding Childhood Spirituality in "Along the Way" and speaks nationally presenting and consulting on these issues. Steve and his wife, Amy, live in Franklin, TN and have three children.

<u>Earl Lavender</u> is a professor in the College of Bible and Ministry as well as the Hazelip School of Theology. He received his Ph.D. from Saint Louis University in Historical Theology. He has written numerous books and published articles, as well as providing entries for several encyclopedias of Ancient History. His current research focuses on the personal narratives of his students (he interviews each individually) and their search for a meaningful life through investing their personal stories in a larger narrative or philosophy of life. His wife, Rebecca, is a middle school science teacher, and together they have three married children and six grandchildren. They live in Brentwood.
